



Wilson stayed at the top by defeating Ernie Plye, 18 to 0] on Friday, October 8, at Ernie


Wilson scored in the first quarter on an offensive drive from their own 35 yard line. The TD. was made when Monte McDonald went over from the two yard line. A pass for the con-
